Participants will learn about the impact of the social and physical environment of people with disabilities, the relevant legislation, regulations, and standards needed when planning and executing a rating, and about universal design principles and standards.



Upon successful completion of the Rick Hansen Foundation Accessibility Certification™ Training, students are eligible to write the online exam, administered by CSA Group, to achieve their RHFAC Professional designation.

Course Prerequisites

- You have a diploma or degree in architecture, engineering, urban planning, interior design, or a related program; or
- You have a Journeyman Certificate of Qualification in a designated trade related to building construction; or
- You are an engineer or are eligible for registration as an engineer; or
- You are an architect or are eligible for registration as an architect; or
- You have a minimum of five years' experience related to accessibility in the built environment and/or building construction.
- You should possess a high level of proficiency with computer systems and programs, including MS Excel, as well as solid written and verbal communication skills.

Within the next 20 years, the number of Canadians with disabilities is expected to grow to more than 9 million.
