With significant shifts in the labour force expedited by the pandemic, the world of work is changing at a pace that is difficult to comprehend. University continuing education units are adaptable and agile, and are vital assets to universities, provincial governments, and industry and we share a passion for what we do.

As university educators, we are committed to taking an inclusive approach to provide learners with the ability to adapt their skills to the evolving labour market and changing skill needs. We can help individuals and organizations increase capacity, confidence, and resilience. STATEMENT FROM CAUCE PRESIDENT CHRISTIE SCHULTZ



The 69th annual CAUCE conference, held in Winnipeg, signaled our eagerly-anticipated return to a in-person event. A lot has changed since Hamilton 2019. As one delegate stated, "the future rarely arrives in a fashion that is both predictable and convenient".

Indeed, looking back to 2019, it's evident that very few of us could have accurately envisioned the scale and magnitude of change the future had in store for us. Ranging from wide-reaching global disruptions, mounting conflicts, environmental degradation, global warming - all set against a backdrop of mounting economic uncertainty.

The gathering served as a timely reminder of our enduring legacy, and our collective responsibility to build on our strengths. This commitment to lifelong education and to each other is what we need in times of change – it is how we'll continue to meet the challenges of the future together. 
